As a 37-year librarian with Butte County Library, I welcome the opportunity to manage the Chico Branch Library after having run up and down "the ridge" managing the Paradise and

Introducing New Chico Children's Librarian: Lydia Neeley

I discovered a fascination with early literacy, Picture Books, and young adult speculative fiction. Information



literacy, and how children, teens, and young adults navigate the waters of the world wide web and information overload, is of particular interest to me.

While still in grad school I began my library career at an academic library, and had the opportunity to build a juvenile curriculum and literature collection from nearly the ground up. I became the liaison to the Teacher Education department, implementing new Common Core strategies and creating a resource for students who were planning to become elementary teachers. I also worked in the university archives, did reference, and adjunct taught.

But my interests always leaned toward children, tweens and teens. Surprisingly, it was my own library director who sent me the posting about the Children's Librarian position at Chico. He didn't want to see me go, but understood my passions and wanted me to pursue them.

The future: One way I hope to serve Chico families is to build a stellar collection and maintain it well. Having a relevant, meaningful, and entertaining collection that will entice reluctant and fluent readers alike is very important to me.

Before library school I worked as an admission counselor for a university. I spent months out of the year traveling to elementary, junior high, and high schools all over the state promoting the university, and I hope to do the same for the library. I believe the main reason people don't use the library is because they don't truly know what services the library offers. I believe the library to be more than a building full of books, but rather a community space where information access, guided reading, information discovery, literacy, entertainment, collaboration and friendship can all be found. I hope to find methods and opportunities to spread this library message to the community, particularly to families.

I will also be doing the "Babies Love Books" early literacy Storytimes. I can't tell you how excited I am to be able to apply early literacy skills with babies and adults in such a fun, tangible way.

In undergrad I majored in music. I sing often and can play piano, hand percussion, and dabble in a few other instruments.

♦ My husband and I are avid travelers. I have been to Alaska, Hawaii, Canada, Oaxaca, India (Kolkata and Darjeeling), The Kingdom of Bhutan, Singapore, Brazil, and this spring we are taking 10 college students to Cambodia.
