City Council Reduces Funding to Our Library

We THANK THE CITY COUNCIL for its funding of the Chico Branch of the Butte County Library for the last 12 to 13 years.

We do understand that tough decisions have had to be made in the last two years. But we are very disappointed that the Chico City Council chose to reduce library funding to \$75,000 in fiscal year 2014-2015 (down \$25,000 [25%] from \$100,000 in fiscal year 2013-2014) at its budget meeting on Tuesday June 17th, despite recommendations from the Council's Finance Committee and library staff to continue funding at the same level.

The result of the loss of these funds is that the library may face reduced hours by the end of 2014.

A major argument offered for cutting library funding was that it had not been cut before. This is not true. The City of Chico cut its funding of the library by more than \$71,000 in fiscal years 2009-2010 (\$40,000) and 2012-2013 (\$31,828).

We as Friends of the Chico Library fight every year for funding for this important resource. CFOL President Diane Friedman's Letter to The Editor in the Enterprise Record (Sunday, July 22) contained significant facts and arguments supporting CFOL's contention that the Chico library provides important services and resources for Chico citizens of all ages and all economic levels and is available for the benefit of everyone in the greater Chico area. It is appropriate that the city support our Chico Branch Library, the largest and busiest of the Butte County libraries.

Chico citizens use their library-how much is indicated by the following recent statistics for just the month of May: Total card holders: 49,785 Checkouts and renewals: 52,220 Library visits: 31,123 Reference questions: 2,705 Public internet sign ups: 2,600

Where else can Chico get this kind of return for money spent?

Your city council members who voted to maintain the \$100,000 funding for the Chico Branch were Mark Sorensen and Sean Morgan. Ann Schwab and Mary Golf voted to reduce library funding by 50%. A compromise was reached when Scott Gruendl, Sorensen, Morgan, and Goloff voted to reduce funding by 25%. Schwab, Tami Ritter, and Randall Stone voted no. Stone voted no on all motions for funding for the library and did not enter the discussion.

Remember: The library may have to cut its open hours by the end of 2014 if the \$25,000 is not restored to its budget. We urge vou to contact vour city council members to encourage them to continue their support of the Chico Branch Library by restoring the \$25,000.

In the teen area, Lydia and Leslie have made significant changes to accommodate computers for teens. Leslie also expanded the number of Manga titles and the display area for the popular collection. Our next change will be to increase the teen area space later in the summer.

The public computer area will expand to provide more space and privacy for users, with new computers arriving near the end of July.

In the adult non-fiction area we are weeding, lowering shelves, and shifting the collection. The end product will be more space on shelves for face-out display. Very tall books will lie on the lowest shelves.

Reference is being weeded, with many titles moving to the circulating collection. Moving a large section of reference shelving later this summer will make the footprint of the reference area smaller, resulting in more space beyond the reference area to host public programs. A microphone stand contributed by Chico Friends of the Library will be useful for those programs.

Programming this spring included a popular poetrywriting program, Poets and Writers and California Humanities, which was sponsored by CFOL. Animé, a movie genre popular with preteens and teens, has been added to our Movie Licensing USA license. Our very first Animé showing had an attendance of 22! Regular movie showings on Thursday or Sunday afternoons are drawing 20 to more than 30 people per showing. We have alternated new release animated films with popular blockbusters.

Infopeople's week-long grant-writing program in the library's meeting room this spring was attended by library and nonprofit staff from northern California. Several Butte County Library staff are now ready to assist in the writing of grants to improve library services or to aid the various Friends of Library or Library Advisory Boards in their pursuit of grants. In June the library hosted another popular Infopeople grant which brought to each branch a new iPad and staff training on making better use of the iPad in the library.

A big thank you to CFOL as just about everything mentioned above would not be possible without their support. And a big thank you to the volunteers who contribute more than 1,300 hours each month, tirelessly assisting branch staff in making library use valuable to their community.





In Remembrance of Gerald Davis

As a young boy growing up in Pittsburg, California, Gerald learned that the public library was an incomparable source of both entertainment and education—and you couldn't beat the price! Having an unlimited supply of reading material was such a boon, as money was always tight in his singleparented family of four.



After marrying a nice Chico girl who also appreciated the library, Gerald passed his lifelong love of reading to all three of his children. His daughter fondly remembers leaving the house early on Saturday mornings, so Mom could sleep in, and driving with her brothers to what was then the Chico Public Library on 2nd and Salem. Climbing those pink stone steps, with Dad's hand firmly in hers, always felt like the beginning of a great adventure.

Jerry read to his children regularly, and more importantly, he read *in front* of them, always modeling the great joys to be found in a good book—and in fact, all three children are today voracious readers.

In his later years, he devoted many volunteer hours to keeping the Chico Library open consistently. In 2002, Gerald took on the position of Financial Advisor to the Chico Friends of the Library (with his wife, Susan, serving as Treasurer), and he continued in this position until his death in May 2014.

Even during the final weeks of his life, Jerry thought about the library a great deal; one of the last pieces he wrote was an impassioned plea to the Board to spend its accumulated Building Fund in a number of concrete and creative ways.

Gerald loved the library, and he loved his library colleagues. He always spoke highly of the caliber of the staff and volunteers of the Chico Library. He developed a warm and collegial relationship with the two bank tellers who received the library book sale deposit every Monday morning for twelve years. Truly, his work with the library was one of the sustaining forces in his life.

He will be missed.
