

Northern California Author to Speak at Annual Meeting

Author Catriona McPherson (<http://catrionamcpherson.com>) is this year's speaker at the Chico Friends of the Library Annual Meeting, May 17 at 7 p.m. in the Chico Branch Library meeting room. Come early, as this promises to be a popular event.

A former academic linguist, Catriona is now a full-time fiction writer, the multi-award-winning writer of the Dandy Gilver detective series, set in the author's native Scotland in the 1920s.

Catriona also writes a strand of award-winning contemporary standalones, including (among several) *THE CHILD GARDEN* (2015) and *THE DAY SHE DIED* (2014). *THE CHILD GARDEN*, a Mary Higgins Clark award finalist, is now shortlisted for an Agatha.

QUIET NEIGHBORS, Catriona's new book, has as its heroine a librarian (a cataloguer) and is set in a bookshop. *QUIET NEIGHBORS* is scheduled for publication in the US April 8 and will be available for purchase at our Annual meeting. The author generously is donating all profits from book sales at our event to benefit CFOL and copies purchased then can be signed.

Catriona is a proud member of Sisters in Crime, Mystery Writers of America, The Crimewriters' Association, The Society of Authors, and Scottish PEN. She has lived in Northern California since 2010.

Catriona's talk will be preceded by a short business meeting for the election of CFOL officers and board members for

2016-2018. Planning and bidding processes are under way for a new roof for the Chico Branch Library and for needed interior enhancements and innovations.

The building made it safely through most of this year's rainy season with the roof patches performed in the last few years, but the entire roof will be replaced before next winter.

The RFID (radio frequency ID) and automatic materials handling system, which is out to bid now with installation planned for early fall, is a significant change. Necessary changes to the book drop areas will require reconfiguration of

the entry doors and the circulation desk. Since most item check-out and return will be handled by patrons themselves, the new front desk will be a customer service space where patrons can apply for library cards and get directions to library locations and services.

A "makerspace" will replace the reference desk area—makerspaces (AKA hackerspaces, hackspaces, or fablabs) are DIY places where people can create, invent, and learn. Glass walls and secure doors will surround the existing counters and house our much-used 3D printers. A sewing machine, a typewriter, and a variety of tools and craft supplies will be available there.

Expansion of the public computer area will include carrels to allow some privacy for computer users, more computers, and solid surface flooring.

Continuing metamorphosis of the teen area will include friendly, useful spaces for group and individual projects.

Chico Friends of the Library is funding some of these alterations and improvements that will help our library staff provide 21st century service to the citizens of Butte County.

High Hopes for 2016-2017 Library Budget

Supervisor Larry Wahl has approached Butte County Chief Administrative Officer Paul Hahn and Library Director Mel Lightbody with a proposal to include funds in the 2016-2017 fiscal year's library budget to reopen the Chico Branch Library for eight hours on Mondays.

Chico Library patrons from all over the county have sorely missed the Chico Branch Monday hours since the City of Chico decided not to fund those hours in the 2015-2016 fiscal year. The City is still refilling the reserve funds it had been borrowing from, so is not planning for increased funding in many areas in the new fiscal year.

The entire Butte County budget will be discussed during supervisor meetings in April. Like all of the budget, Wahl's proposal, also supported by Supervisor Maureen Kirk, will need the support of at least three supervisors to pass. Volunteers Feted

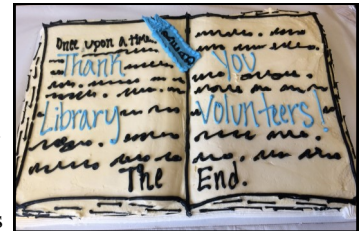

Adult coloring has been likened to meditation in its ability to relieve stress and encourage relaxation.

The popularity of adult coloring exploded in 2015, sparked by Joanna Basford's *Secret Garden Coloring Book* (Laurence King, 2013). Bookstores and craft stores stock books with an array of images for coloring, among them geometrics, florals, mandalas, animals, stained glass, and cities and buildings.
