Chico Branch Enhancements and Changes

RFID Project: Library staff touched each and every item in the library collection to tag it for RFID. The acronym refers to Radio-Frequency Identification - small electronic devices that consist of a small chip and an antenna. The chip is capable of carrying about 2,000 bytes of data about the book.

The RFID device serves the same purpose as a bar code or a magnetic strip on the back of a credit card or ATM card; it provides a unique identifier for that object. Just as a bar code or magnetic strip is scanned to get the information, the RFID device is scanned to retrieve the identifying information.

RFID Works Better Than Barcodes. We are all familiar with the difficulty at checkout in the library and elsewhere making sure that a barcode gets successfully read. A significant advantage of RFID devices over the others mentioned above is that the RFID device does not need to be positioned exactly to be scanned. RFID devices will work within a few feet of the scanner. For example, you can put several books or other media items on the scanner. It will query all of the RFID devices and total your check out immediately.

RFID technology has been available for more than fifty years, but only recently have manufacturing costs for RFID devices fallen to the point where they can be used cost effectively as a "throwaway" inventory or control device.

Automated Materials Handling (AMH): This is automation to reduce or eliminate the need for staff or patrons to check in, check out, or sort material, or to move bins containing library media. Those jobs are handled by check-in machines, sorters, and conveyors to speed up processes throughout Butte County Library's busiest branches.

With AMH, Chico library patrons' materials can be checked in before they set foot inside the library or just inside the door. Patrons are now walking through the doors with a clean slate and their hands free. Circulation increases because reshelving items happens quickly. Staff can spend more time on programs and interacting with patrons.



There are two primary strategies in the AMH industry: drop-and-go and intelligent return. Drop-and-go is more like a traditional book drop and operates faster for the patron, delivering a receipt to the patron's email address later, after items are checked in.

Oroville, Paradise, Gridley will have drop-and-go systems.

Chico Branch Library has an intelligent return system. This system controls the input speed for patrons returning items, allowing insertion of <u>only one</u> piece at a time. However, checkin happens instantaneously and the system provides a printed receipt with 100 percent certainty of materials returned on the spot. The system even identifies non-library material, like schoolbooks or personal copies, and returns them to the patron immediately.

The Chico Branch intelligent return and sorter system starts from the interior and exterior wall-mounted check-in machines. Once an item is checked in, the system automatically forwards it on the conveyor belt system to one of five bins. From the window in the library's interior wall to the right of the intelligent book return, one can watch material travel along the conveyor and drop into a bin for: fiction; Spanish or YA; juvenile; non-fiction; media; or "holds" and items in transit. The sorter is capable of handling 2,700 items per hour, with sweep technology designed to ensure proper sorting without damage.

Other Remodel Projects: Come on into your branch library and see what other exciting changes are happening for you: new doors, new entry to Children's, expanded public computer area, expanded media area, overhead presentation projector in meeting room, and a redesigned Teen Space with technology plugins, new carpet and bright wall colors.

Coming soon for teens: F is for FANDOM CLUB! A new YA program kicks off February 27 3:30 to 4:30 PM in the Chico Branch Teen Space! This program is happening because our staff are no longer robots! Staff can spend time being creative about meeting patron needs.


