

#### **Book in Common: 2017 – 2018** Ann Elliott

A Deadly Wandering by Matt Richtel recounts the tragic car crash resulting from "texting while driving" interwoven with the personal and professional backgrounds of many involved with the incident and its aftermath. It follows the young man, Reggie Shaw, who caused the accident, his family, the victims' families, and the

investigators who brought the case to trial. Reggie Shaw has since become a leading advocate for the prevention of distracted driving.

Richtel thoroughly recounts the studies of neuroscientists who, as early as the 1850s, have been investigating developing technology and how it effects human attention and other brain functions. Evolving technology continues to affect how we knowingly improve our standard of living by enhancing human efficiency and "executive" performance. However, it also has addictive effects on the earliest evolved instinctual parts of our brain. The beeps and ringtones from our personal electronic devices alert our fight or flight response centers. Video games, email, texts, and other social media appeal to our basic social desires.

Starting with the millennial generation (Americans born between 1982 and 2004), technology and personal electronic devices have become ubiquitous. Richtel weaves stories of personal revelation and scientific discovery into a compelling and easy to read narrative. It is a powerful foundation for discussions about the effects of technology on our lives.

The Book in Common is an ongoing cooperative project of Chico State University, Butte College, local high schools and libraries that encourages our community to evaluate particular social issues by reading a selected book and discussing its individual and social significance. Check the CSU Chico Book in Common website for community events, including the author's talk Tuesday, Oct. 24. The Chico Branch Library Book Club will discuss A Deadly Wandering at their fourth Thursday in February meetings 2/22/2018, 10 AM and 6 PM.

# **International Student Leaders Visit** the Library Ann Elliott

Student leaders from the Middle East and North Africa participated in an educational and cultural immersion program at Chico State to increase their understanding of leadership, civic engagement, and U.S. culture and society. Two groups of six young adults each spent a Friday morning touring the Chico Branch Library and helping to set up the Friends book sale.

They marveled at our new automated check-in, check out, and book sorting system. They were impressed with our varied spaces: public computers, veterans' resource area, magazine quiet space, teen area, and bright, expansive children's room. Each group caught a story and song during the Friday morning Bi-lingual Story Garden.

We also put them to work. One group scrubbed down the banquet tables with baking soda and vinegar, a much needed maintenance task. Both groups set up tables in the conference room for the book sale and brought out books from the back room in fire-brigade style. They remarked on the number and quality of book donations. As a thank-you gift, book sale manager Helen Sutton offered that they each pick out a couple books to take home. What a treat for them. A serious crowd, they tended to pick out history, non-fiction and classic literature.

It was fun to hear of their community efforts in their home countries: legal aid; literacy training; business development; and social services. The Library Staff and Friends were pleased to participate in the program and share a bit of our culture.
