Chico Library Branch Manager Brenda Crotts retired January 31. Officially she will no longer be at the library daily, but unofficially she will be around and contributing to local library culture as she has for years.

Brenda came to Butte County in the early 70's when her husband accepted a library position at Chico State. Her library career started at Butte College; then she went to work

fulltime for the Butte County Library system in 1977-and stayed for the next 40 years! Brenda was the County's first professional technical services manager and instituted changes and practices that were used not just countywide but throughout northern California where she demonstrated innovations and trained library staff.

Eventually Brenda worked in public services and then library management. She was administrator at various times at Butte County's three largest branches: Paradise, Oroville, and Chico. When asked about highlights of her career she said, "There was always something new." She saw the advent of online catalogs, cataloging locally, and many other progressive practices. This pattern continued right up to the last year as she oversaw installation of the RFID circulation system and inauguration of Virtual Reality and the new Maker Space at Chico.

Just as Brenda and her husband Joe Crotts arrived in North State together to start library careers, they ended them on the same day, a

unique event. Brenda's active and innovative style and her colorful appearance will be missed at Chico Branch. But she's not going away. She plans to engage in new learning opportunities such as OLLI classes and to make book suggestions regularly. She has served on the local Book-in-Common selection committee for 10 years and will continue in that. We wish her the best on new endeavors and thank her for her many contributions.

New Chico Branch Librarian is Homegrown Diane Friedman

We are fortunate to have Susie Serrano as our new Chico Branch Librarian. Susie is an old friend with a great deal of

experience. Susie started at the Chico Branch in 1994 as a Private Industry Council (PIC) summer worker while still in high school. She would have preferred a more



"exciting" job placement, but the library won her over. After high school, she started as a part time employee that led to a full time job as a library assistant. While working full time, Susie continued her education until she received her Masters in Library & Information Science from San Jose State in 2009. Yes, libraries really do change lives!

Since then she has become a leader, starting with being the county-wide Children's Librarian. In 2014, Susie became the Paradise Branch Librarian. During her time in Paradise, she worked with the staff and Paradise Friends of the Library (PFOL) promoting the library in the community, participating in community events, and improving the function of the branch. Among other endeavors in the Paradise Branch, they added more tables and computer carrels,

Successful Grant Writing by Staff Benefits Maker Space

Butte County Library recently received two competitive technology related grants from Southern California Library Cooperative totaling \$20,000: the Libraries Illuminated grant and the Innovation Station grant. In this upcoming year, projects and programs from the two grants will gradually roll out to the public, please stay tuned!

Funds from the Libraries Illuminated grant will allow the library to purchase technology upgrades, robotic kits, media streaming equipment, and additional VR gear. These expand our STEM programming at the library and enrich the use of the Makerspace.

The Innovation Station grant will facilitate the idea of "Makerboxes" - boxes with different themes that can be checked out by patrons or organizations. The Innovation Station grant is a joint effort between the Butte County Library and the Tehama County Library, as well as several local organizations and schools providing support letters.



New Virtual Reality Equipment and Content

Patrons are enjoying the opportunity to explore and play in a virtual world with Chico Library's Virtual Reality Experience. The library recently received a HTC Vive

(headset and controller) in addition to the Oculus Rift set, as well as some more platform-specific content.

HTC Vive provides a slightly different experience from the Oculus; the headset is more comfortable to wear and more adjustable for smaller heads and the handsets are larger. Exciting new content for Oculus includes: theBlu - Deep ocean experience, close encounters with sea turtles and giant whales; Fruit Ninja - Fun and good workout; Mars Odyssey - You are the astronaut to explore Mars, weld the hull of a Martian base, and pilot a Mars rover.
