We are proud of what our Book Sale volunteers do for our community--patronage of the book sale supports the library while patrons themselves benefit from the huge selection of books and magazines available at the sale. CFOL's Saturday morning sale of donated used books took in over \$73,000 in 2019!

All of those earnings go to the library to buy books and movies (currently \$08000 a month), magazines, furniture, technology, craft supplies, and other materials that benefit library patrons.

Butte County Libraries Long- Range Plan

Recently, the Butte County Board of Supervisors approved a new strategic plan for the library. Since the adoption of the last strategic plan in 2010, much has changed in the delivery of library services, such as implementation of new technology, emerging new programming areas, and partnerships to meet community needs.

Library administration, staff and the library advisory board began work on the new strategic plan in late 2018. With the assistance of a consultant, the process of developing the plan assisted the library in assessing and analyzing community needs, and establishing new goals and objectives. The development of the new strategic plan involved extensive community conversations as well as input by staff and stakeholders.

The new strategic plan provides future direction of operations and priorities in support of the library's vision: "to create a 21 st Century library service that is inclusive, efficient, collaborative and innovative."

The plan focuses on three primary areas:

- 1. FACILITATE community engagement and connections throughout Butte County to leverage our presence and purpose in services to our communities.
- 2. ACTIVATE communities to solve systemic problems and realize elusive opportunities in Butte County.
- 3. REJUVENATE community and individual lives through sustained attention to healing, rebuilding, reconnecting, and growing capacity and community will in Butte County.

The new strategic plan will guide the library through 2025. There is much to accomplish to reach the desired destination and we will keep you updated along the way - look for news on new initiatives and please come visit if you have not been in a while!
