Guest Speaker Eric Miller


Eric Miller began humor writing in the early 1990s with the column *Garbage Talk*, which appeared in several gerbil-powered Northern Sacramento Valley newspapers before Al Gore invented the internet. Eric worked in the garbage business at the time and wrote strange but true landfill stories. The landfill humor gig stopped when he moved to Chico because upper management said he wouldn't be taken seriously.

Eric rebooted his humor writing in 2012 with the Chico Enterprise-Record's *North State Voices*. His columns focused on family life, ranging from adult acne to misplaced car keys. Then came the *Etc. Guy* blog in 2013 and his book "Let Me Tell You a Story" in 2014.

Eric's blog consistently holds last place on the entire internet. Is he fazed? Naah. *Etc. Guy* unabashedly shares the tales of a father in the sandwich generation. He aims to stay out of trouble with his daughters and parents, and lives to tell the story. He's a dreadful handyman, terrible mechanic, and has-been athlete with tired lungs and weak knees.

Several of his stories were recorded and archived on Nancy's Bookshelf on NSPR, KCHO 91.7 FM Chico. Eric has co-emceed the Butte County Library's *Trivia Bee for Literacy* fundraiser since 2015. A Letter from the Interim Butte **County Library Director**

Greetings, Chico Friends

Butte County provides a variety of community services to our residents, making it a great place to live, raise a family and retire. In recent years, the County has taken several steps to maintain transparent and open government, while controlling costs to make services to our residents more efficient. However, our County has lost millions of dollars annually from State clawbacks and unfunded mandates,

hurting the County's ability to provide services at the levels residents want and need. In addition, catastrophic fires, floods, and droughts have provided challenges to our County.

Currently many of our rural and remote fire stations have below the number of recommended firefighters needed to respond when more than one emergency happens at the same time, and our sheriff's patrols need greater support-there are times when only five deputies are on duty to patrol more than 1,200 miles of County roads.

In addition, Library hours have been cut! And many of our other county services, including but not limited to programs impacting the County Assessor, Probation Officers, District Attorney and Development Services, have been reduced or eliminated.

The county's priority is protecting the safety of our residents and maintaining the quality of life we all value in our communities. To provide stable, local funding to help close the budget gap and meet our needs, County staff are exploring placing a 1¢ sales tax measure on the November 5, 2024 ballot.

This would provide funds to support general government uses, such as wildfire protection and response, retaining and attracting qualified sheriff deputies and reducing crime, supporting local businesses, addressing homelessness, **restoring library hours**, and supporting veterans' services. Any local funding measure would include fiscal accountability requirements, including required public disclosure of all spending. Essential purchases such as groceries, prescription medicine, diapers and feminine hygiene products are exempt from sales tax.

As we chart the course for the future of Butte County, we want to ensure that the voices of County residents are heard. The perspective and priorities of our community members are invaluable as we plan for the allocation of resources and funding to meet the needs of our community.
